We think these materials will help you to teach your students more effectively and help your students to achieve their literacy goals more efficiently.



- **Group Classes:** We now have volunteers instructing **14** weekly classes! The need in our community for literacy instruction continues to increase and, unfortunately, our tutor numbers just cannot keep up. Right now **11** volunteers are teaching these classes — including one former student! We couldn't help nearly as many students without the dedication and time that these rock-star volunteers have put in! If you or anyone you know are interested in teaching a small Group Class, please contact us. We know that your time is limited, but this is great way to make a tremendous impact on the community with very little time invested!
- **New Lending Library:** Since receiving the Community Development Block Grant in 2017, we have made many much needed improvements to the Language & Learning Lab, and to our Group Class spaces. In light of these spatial and hardware updates — which have allowed us to better accommodate our ever growing student body population we have decided to update the way in which students and Group Class Instructors access to educational materials. Students who cannot afford to *purchase* their books will soon be able to check them out with a small deposit. More details will follow as soon as it is up and running. For Group Classes, we've been seeking out materials that will make it easier for someone with no previous teaching experience to instruct. Also, instructors will be able to check out books for use in their classes so that all students can be on the same page — literally!
- **Window Painting Contest:** For those of you who were in and around the office in December we hope you got a chance to check out our amazing window art painted by our Educational Programming Coordinator, Madison! We are so proud to announce that our window art won 2nd Place in Railside's Holiday Window Painting Contest. Thanks to Madison for sharing her artistic talent and to all of you for voting for her work!

While we firmly believe that it is still important for our students to invest in their own education, we don't want access to materials to be a barrier to learning. We hope this new Lending Library will make it easier everyone to have access to the materials that they need.

A Simple Twist of Fate: Tutor Spotlight & Memorial Dennis and Densel

One of Densel's favorite quotes, which means so much to Dennis as well, was from Fred Rogers: "If you could only sense how important you are to the lives of those you meet; how important you can be to the people you may never even dream of. There is something of yourself that you leave at every meeting with another person."

Dennis De Leon, a former student of Densel Rasmussen (b. 1955 — d. 2017), started his journey to LCofGI from Guatemala. He worked with Densel at LCofGI for many years, and during that time they grew close. They would even meet at Densel's house on Wednesday nights to study, share a meal, and watch Modern Family. When Densel became ill, Dennis took another step on his journey with Densel by moving into Densel's

house to help him as he became more dependent on others. During their years together, Dennis and Densel grew to be like family and Dennis slowly became bilingual. Though Densel has passed, the impact he left on Dennis' life and the lives of others in our community continues even now: Dennis was inspired by Densel to volunteer for Habitat for Humanity, and to pursue teaching with LCofGI. He said he could hear Densel telling him to spread the good.

The student has become the teacher. After "graduating" from LCofGI's program, he began to volunteer by teaching bi-weekly Group Classes for Spanish speakers. Dennis feels that by volunteering, he is honoring Densel whom he considers to have been a father to him. Dennis felt that, "To me he was my dad even though he didn't bring me into this world, because he did something better; he give a good life to live, the right path that he set me on, and he made me the person who I am right now."

We all miss Densel Rasmussen, and honor his memory for the time and effort he dedicated to LCofGI. Dennis wants us all to remember Densel's life motto, which Dennis uses as a guide for how he wants to live his life now: "Go into the world and do well. But more importantly, go into the world and do good."
